QUIZ 3: Word for Words

- Words made up of initials. **Acronyms**
- Words that have two or more different meanings. **Homonyms**
- Words which are pronounced the same, but are spelt differently. **Homophones**
- Words, although spelt the same, are pronounced differently depending on meaning. **Heteronyms**
- Words that spell the same forwards and backwards. **Palindromes**
- Words that have been created from two words to express the meaning of both. **Portmanteaux.**(Apparently created by Lewis Carrol, who compared it with a portmanteau bag, where two parts fold together to make one!)
- Words that have been created by combining sources from two different languages. **Hybrids**
- The (mistaken) transposition of the initials of two or more words or syllables. **Spoonerisms** (After the Rev. William Spooner who apparently had a habit of muddling his initial letters.)
- 9 Words or phrases which are out of place in the time of its context. **Anachronisms**
- 10 Using wrong but similar sounding words. Malapropisms
 (From Sheridan's play 'The Rivals' where the character, Mrs Malaprop, frequently used the wrong word. In turn, Sheridan created her name from the idea of 'bad' (mal) and 'appropriate')
