

James O'Neill on Fine Art

was pleasantly surprised when Philip asked me to contribute an article to the local newsletter, but then the 'pleasant' part gave way to a sense of trepidation; what, exactly, was I to write about? In the end, I thought that a brief chronological introduction, to

explain how and why I am where I am today, then a description of what I'm doing and learning on the course itself, seemed to be the best approach, so here goes...

I started painting and drawing at night school

about 10 or 12 years ago – I'd had never taken Art at school, so it was a complete start from basics for me. The tutor 'talked' me into taking GCSE at 'O' level, and then the 'A' level'. After taking early retirement in 2001, I investigated the possibility of going a little further; a quick search on the net showed that there was an Art & Design Foundation Course in Epsom, at the Surrey Institute of Art & Design. This involved two days a week part time over two years and besides the basic painting and drawing, the curriculum

also covered photography and film developing and printing, basic graphic design, introductory printmaking and three-dimensional work.

It was during the second year at Epsom that my wife and I decided we could manage my going forward on a

> full-time basis for a BA (Hons) degree in Fine Art. As I didn't fancy the prospect of commuting into London to any of the colleges there, I stayed with the Surrey Institute, at its second campus at Farnham.

During the first year, there were workshops in stone carving, printmaking (silkscreen and etching), and in the metal workshop, we were shown spot welding, oxy-acetylene welding and how to use a plasma-cutter. These are all voluntary workshops, and come with full Health and Safety issues, but you

don't get to use the equipment unless you achieve the right competency levels.

The course itself is modular, and you are pretty much left to your own devices in the studios. The are regular tutorials by the full-time staff, and

> there are even opportunities to get one-to-ones with visiting artists. There are Theory components throughout the course, in parallel with all the practical work. These deal, essentially, with the history of Art since the

beginning of the 20th century, together with the social, scientific and economic influences that have affected Art 'movements' to the present day (I must admit that I didn't expect to be reading Freud and psychoanalysis theory when I first enrolled!)

On the whole, it's been a really good experience so far, and there's a lot more to go before Final Dissertation early next year and Final Major Project for the early summer.

The Bank of England Museum

Bartholomew Lane: 1.45pm on 29th March

We shall see an audiovisual show, and visit the museum and shop (alas no free samples!) Entrance is free but numbers are limited, so you must book in advance. First come, first served!

The museum documents the history of the Bank of England since its formation in 1694. Displays include historical banknotes, coins and even Roman gold bars. There is also a collection of weapons, including pikes and muskets,

used to defend against robbery.

There are also many fine paintings, and the permanent exhibits include a look into the fantastic detail put into banknotes throughout history in order to deter forgeries. Visitors are also encouraged to take the mental aptitude tests that applicants joining the bank in Victorian London were required to pass and are given the opportunity to hold a genuine gold bar.

Jack Wheeler's Japanese garden: 15th May


