This visit was so popular that we needed to organise **three** visits. This must be unprecedented within the same year. Our tours of St Pancras Renaissance Hotel in February and March were so popular we booked a third tour in May. We all enjoyed hearing the chequered history of the splendid Midland Grand Hotel envisaged by George Gilbert Scott and the Midland Railway. Chris, our informative guide explained the neo-Gothic decoration in the Grand Staircase and how the current sumptuous reception area had been built within a roadway while the original small area became a restaurant.

Two of the groups were allowed into a first floor suite where I was impressed how the bathroom had been built within the bedroom preserving the Victorian cornice above. The original design had only one bathroom per floor, an arrangement that was already out of date by the early 1900s.

Twenty years ago the original upper floors were converted and sold as flats leaving just the first floor luxury suites to complement a modern wing of bedroom suites. Some of our February party extended their day in the British Library while the warmer weather in May encouraged a canalside walk for refreshments.




