Your Committee is always looking for new ideas and suggestions so please do get in touch. Contact details are in the Newsletter and also on our website. I hope the weather will soon improve and that we are all able to reap the benefits of a warm sunny climate during 2013

At the New Year lunch, Chris told us of the objectives of the AVIVA Fellowships. He has summarised them here (in bold type), and I have added some of my personal thoughts.

- 1. Views & concerns of Members are conveyed to the Company,
 - If there are any matters which you feel need to be raised with the Company, do let a Committee member know and we will follow it up as appropriate.
- 2. Advise Members of relevant Company matters to retain connection,

We do our best via 'In Touch', our web-site, Newsletter etc. Any suggestions of how this could be improved?

3. Support less able Members' welfare via appropriate groups,

I think we could improve this, but, again, any practical suggestions how?

4. Ensure event programs are arranged to keep social contact,

I think we do this well, but we are always ready to hear of other ideas and to welcome offers of help.

5. Serving and retired staff local links are maintained.

Passwords to the Aviva Fellowship site were always a flower, so a mnemonic to remember 'VASES' would place them all together!!!!

You will find a copy of the accounts for 2012 on our web site*. A Company grant was received for 2012 of £ 4,458 (2011 £ 4,410) to help with activities and administration. Overall expenses and event costs were £ 1,200 over our income. Excess expenditure largely resulted from planned heavily subsidised annual New Year and themed surprise FREE (£ 750+) Diamond Jubilee lunches.

Dramatic increases in postal costs arose (£1,000+) excluding printing, envelope & label costs for the year. Personally I have 'gifted' 11,000 envelopes at the outset of my tenure which now need supplementing. Further stamps were purchased before the April increase and our remaining holding, although reduced by a third, has increased its face value by £ 300+.

Regarding overall Newsletter printing, postage costs, and facing a 30% reduction in our company grant we must review our policies. Despite numerous requests, (500+) group of our Members, most of whom we believe have emails, have so far failed to provide them. We have already invested in our own website and an enhanced colour version of our next Newsletter, together with past copies, will be held & available on our website. We decided to advise these Members that additional hard copies will only be supplied if requested to contain unnecessary costs?

We aim to provide regular updates, via email where required, of our activities. Members who have told us they do not have emails will not be affected.

We reduced prepayments for 2013 by £1,000 and residual funds only remain in line with immediate needs and our Secretary has Nil funds currently. In the current economic climate, our events require early deposits and pre-payment months in advance! We are pleased our FREE Coffee Mornings in Croydon have managed to attract more new Members. To this end we have added a quarterly subsidised Breakfast option (£750+ costs are subject to review). Apart from our Diamond Jubilee Lunch we have not been able to offer local Theatre, Excursions or some other Events as we have lost the services of former Organisers.

The accounts, by activity, indicate the extent to which the Committee has been able to subsidise each activity. My thanks go once again to Richard Carr, as our Auditor, and Maggie Mahoney for her very considerable help and assistance in preparing these accounts. I would like to welcome Chris Garrett, who assumes this role, and I know our Funds will be in expert hands


TOWER OF LONDON – Tuesday 16th April


Both the above London visits are likely to be very popular, so please apply early.

REPORTS ON SOME RECENT EVENTS

STRAWBERRY HILL HOUSE – Wednesday 15th August 2012









A medium grey sky greeted us at Clapham Junction as 20 or so members were mustering for our Strawberry Hill House trip to Twickenham. An immediate delight 'steamed' by in the form of 'Bittern', an A4-class ('Streak') locomotive, hauling a trainload of steam enthusiasts to the West Country.

After a short journey together on a more mundane train, allowing us to meet & greet some old colleagues, we alighted at Strawberry Hill railway station. A five-minute walk saw the group entering the gates of Strawberry Hill, home of Horace Walpole (1717-1797), third son of Sir Robert, Britain's first Prime Minister. Welcoming teas and coffees were served before we split into two groups of 14 to start our tours.

Julie, our knowledgeable guide for the tour, then explained Walpole had purchased it, as one of the last remaining sites available on the banks of the Thames in the fashionable countryside of Twickenham. He perversely, and totally contrary to the then Italianate fashion, set about transforming what was a couple of cottages into his 'little gothic castle'. It featured pinnacles, battlements (crenulations), round tower and held his lifetime collection of art & glass exhibits. The castle (or villa) became an elite tourist attraction in Walpole's life-time. He used to allow four visitors a day and even published rules for their guidance, one of which was that no children were allowed (nice one, Horace!).

Once inside the house (more like Hogwarts!) we went through the hall to the staircase, lit only by a long hanging Gothic althorn. It was Walpole's idea that some of the corridors and passageways would be deliberately dark and shadowy (he even coined the word 'gloom' to describe this). These would then open out into a sudden splendour such as the Gallery. The restored mouldings there are actually made from papier-mâché, the same as the originals.

Julie, made sure that we knew the history of the house and its owner, including showing us the former location of the ceramic vase that inspired Thomas Gray to write his poem 'On the Death of a Favourite Cat, Drowned in a Tub of Gold Fishes'. Sadly, the vase and the entire contents were later auctioned after his death as he had no direct heirs. The vase and a few of the other contents are now in the V&A. A further little known fact is that after suffering a nightmare, Horace Walpole created the 'gothic horror genre' by his book 'The Castle of Otranto' (1764).

The tour took exactly the scheduled hour and a half returning us then to the café for our booked lunch. For those that missed this excellent trip it is worth a visit and, as for me, I intend to return. It's not like the normal historic house visit but is one with a distinct difference! I must thank Carol Courtney for arranging this visit.

Even so, to see it 'in the flesh' so to speak, is awesome. Soaring pillars, stunning glass windows, the Choir Stalls with historic banners overhead. So many memorials & of course, Poets Corner with many famous names. Very moving, was the Grave of the Unknown Soldier, with the Scarlet Poppies contrasting with the dark marble. Even Kate & William detoured around this, & Kate continued the Royal tradition, started by the Queen Mother, of laying her bouquet here, although it was kept until the photos had been taken.

THE LOCATION OF THE VARIOUS COFFEE VENUES:

About five to ten minutes' walk from both East and West Croydon railway stations, on many bus routes (most buses from the south of the Borough stop almost opposite) and a couple of minutes from the George Street tram stop. Queen Victoria (at least, her statue) is by the entrance to welcome you.

Quarterly (March, June, September and December) breakfast will also be available.

Please note: The above coffee mornings start at 10.00 a.m. Those below start at 10.30

The Dene Restaurant in Knights Garden Centre, Woldingham Road, Woldingham, Surrey. CR3 7LA, a short walk from Woldingham Station or 2nd left at the Wapses Lodge Roundabout just past the Ann Summers building, if approaching from Croydon on A22.

Chartwell, Mapleton Road, Westerham, Kent. TN16 1PS where there is also the opportunity to visit Sir Winston Churchill's home and to roam the gardens. Follow sign posts from Westerham village.

Polhill Garden Centre. At the top of Polhill on the **A224** between Bromley and Sevenoaks or off the M25 Junction 4. Look for the windmill.

Access by public transport is not easy for the last two venues, although an hourly bus service runs from Bromley (route 402) to Badgers Mount for Polhill, so please ask if you would like a lift, to see what we can arrange.
